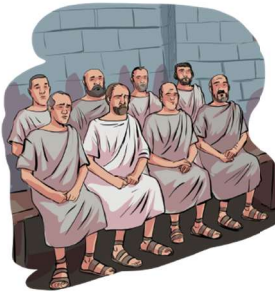
Time can be split into **ages**. Crime and punishment was **different** from age to age:

Roman Britain



When the Romans **invaded**, they already had established laws which were brought over to Britain. Their laws were called the **Twelve Tables** and were written around **450 BCE**. The **court system** used in Roman Britain is still used today.



Anglo-Saxon period

When a **Trial by Jury** couldn't decide if someone was **innocent** or **guilty** they would have a special test called a **Trial by Ordeal**. They believed God would show everyone if they were telling the truth. The Trial by Ordeal would take place in a **church** and there were **different types** of Trial by Ordeal: **trial by hot iron**, **trial by cold water**, **trial by hot water**, and **trial by blessed bread**

The barons made the unpopular **King John** agree to the **Magna Carta**. This was a list of rules that everyone must follow including the king. Everyone must now have a **fair trial**.



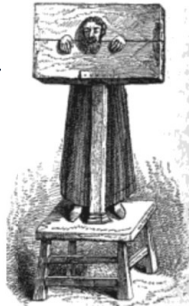
The Stuart period



During the **Stuart period**, women were accused of **witchcraft** and subjected to horrific **tests and trials**. They were usually **punished by hanging or being burnt at the stake**!

The Tudor period

During the **Tudor period**, **harsher punishments** were introduced. These punishments included **execution or embarrassment**.



Georgian Britain

In this period, people travelled more which meant more people were **robbed on the roads**. The **highwaymen** took money and jewellery from **rich travellers**. To try to stop the highwaymen, **hanging** was introduced as the punishment for this crime.



The Victorian era

During the Victorian period, **prisons** were reformed and became more organised. Some prisoners were made to carry out hard labour, either **turning a crank**, **walking on a treadwheel** or **oakham picking**.



The police

During the **Victorian period**, the first **police force** was set up in Britain. In the modern era, the police use technology like **computers and body cameras** to help them catch criminals.
